ALM Tutoríal Program

The fourth Sabbath in February, the ALM Tutorial Program was spotlighted with two of the students presenting posters of African American Inventors who have impacted our daily lives. A third student presented her poster on the contributions of Maya Angelou. Each student was tasked by their respective teacher to develop a poster for Black History Month. The tutors helped each student develop his/her poster and gather facts for their presentations.



N'Sonjai Baker was the first presenter. His poster was on Joseph H. Smith, the

inventor of a lawn sprinkler with a rotational head. Smith later improved his sprinkler with a second patent where the sprinkler heads sprayed water in two directions. Although Smith was not the first to invent the sprinkler, his design is what is used today, especially for irrigating large crops. We had seen examples of the crop sprinkler a couple of miles up the road in the cotton and corn fields. N'Sonjai is a 5th grader at Riverton Intermediate School.



The second presenter was Zacaria Baker. Her poster was on John "Jack" Johnson, the inventor of the wrench. Johnson was a boxer who became the first African American heavyweight champion. He was sent to prison for one year for travelling with a white woman, which was against the law. While in prison he developed a design for the wrench that was patented and used today. It was not the first patent for the wrench, but his patent was the better version. The name was racially titled the "monkey wrench". Zacaria is a 2nd grader at Riverton Elementary School.

N'ziah Powell was the last presenter on Maya Angelou. Her poster depicted Dr. Angelou as an African American woman with many talents: poet, singer, actress, civil rights activist. She published seven autobiographies, three books of essays, several books of poetry, and is credited with a list of plays, movies, and television shows spanning over 50 years. She received dozens of awards and more than 50 honorary degrees. Her first and best-known autobiography is, I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings. N'ziah ended her presentation with two memorable quotes by Dr. Angelou: *"I've learned that people will forget what you said, people will forget how you made them feel"* & *"When someone shows you who they are, believe them the first time"*. N'ziah is a 3rd grader at Riverton Elementary School.

Parental guests for the presenters included Tionia Baker, Shirlirica Taylor and Marvell Spearman. Guest siblings included Usir Powell (also a student in the Tutorial Program) and Marvell (MJ) Spearman, Jr.

The ALM Tutorial Program is coordinated by Pearline McReynolds. She has assembled an outstanding volunteer staff of tutors who are retired teachers, business owners and other retired professionals who are committed to the success of the students and this program
